Structure, governance and management

The company is run by a group of directors and members of the organisation who meet on a regular basis throughout the year.

All directors undertake appropriate charity compliance training and are aware of their obligations and responsibilities in that regard.

The directors have assessed the major risks to which the company is exposed, and are satisfied that systems are in place to mitigate exposure to the major risks.

Objectives and activities

The main activity of the company is to award grants to the Fort Augustus & Glenmoriston community, either to organisations or individuals in the furtherance of the charitable objectives.

Achievements and performance

The directors have worked hard in delivering the apprenticeship scheme and the community caretaker project in the last year, alongside the original Grant Scheme

We have continued to work with the Glengarry Trust and Stratherick & Foyers Community Trust to deliver a coherent and comprehensive apprenticeship scheme. This has allowed us to award a total of 6 apprentices with a further 2 apprentices over the age of 19 to be awarded after March 2015.

The Community Caretakers are growing in strength. We were able to secure a grant from Community Job Scotland via SCVO to employ Jordan Patience as a trainee for the team and he has worked so well that we are intending to keep him employed after his grant finishes. We are complemented on the up keep of both villages and the cemeteries and the men work hard to ensure a standard is maintained. We have leased a vehicle in January this year to make the work easier for the men and it has helped immensely, they feel that they are able to get through more work on a daily basis.

DIRECTORS' REPORT (CONTINUED)

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2015

In our open evening the Apprentices and Community Caretakers were the most approved items and people clearly wished to see them both continue.

We have supported 19 individual students with Travel Bursaries and 3 Individuals for Community Benefit; these were a grant for the walking group to allow them to take part in a walk in Glencoe, a heritage project to celebrate the centenary of the First War with a historical monthly newsletter that is available free and finally a start-up grant for a netball group. The grants to groups in this financial year amount to £64,000 with us supporting both the young and the elderly through the following groups, Fort Augustus Senior Citizens and Glenmoriston Senior Citizens; lunch clubs both in Fort Augustus & Glenmoriston. Sporting groups received money this year when we supported The Glenmoriston Shooting Club & the Glengarry Shinty Club as well as the newly formed netball club. The parent council for the Kilchuimen Academy received funding to assist in providing a School Trip to France for the youngsters to see the Omaha Beach and War Cemetery and I believe they have had a fantastic trip.

Financial review

As the company is spreading its wings in different areas we require more expert help in ensuring our accounts comply with OSCR so we have our book keeping with Johnston Carmichael as well as our financial accounts. This includes payroll as we now have employees. It was decided to stay with Johnston Carmichael currently as the accounts are complex and would end up costing more if we transferred accountants.

The bond we had with RBS has finished and it has yet to be reinvested, we have been seeking advice on where best to invest money as bank interest rates are so low.

It is the policy of the charity that unrestricted funds should be maintained at a level that will ensure that, in the event of a significant drop in funding, they will be able to continue the charity's current activities while consideration is given to ways in which additional funds may be raised. This level of reserves has been maintained throughout the year.

Plans for the future

Last year we advised we were looking at purchasing land and the owners were not in a hurry to sell, so we were looking at the community right to buy and for us to proceed on those terms we require to change our articles and these resolutions will be discussed at the AGM and a vote will be taken.

The company is working hard for the community and in the years to come we will become an even wealthier community and for that reason the board requires to work strategically for the next year in setting up a future plan for the company. This will involve meeting with the community and I am asking you in advance to participate in these meetings as we need to know how to build up our community and think of bigger projects that we can aspire to.

I would like to thank the Directors for the amount of time they have given the company over the last year.

1 Accounting policies

1.1 Basis of preparation

The accounts have been prepared under the historical cost convention then modified to include the investments at market value.

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective April 2008), the statement of Recommended Practice 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities' issued in March 2005 and the Companies Act 2006.

The charity has availed itself of section 396 of Companies Act 2006, as permitted in paragraph 4(1) of Schedule 1 of Statutory Instrument 2008 No.409, and adapted the Companies Act formats to reflect the special nature of the charities activities.

1.2 Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included in the statement of financial activities when the charity is legally entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy. The following specific policies are applied to particular categories of income:-

Voluntary income is received by way of grants, donations and gifts and is included in full in the statement of financial activities when receivable. Grants, where entitlement is not conditional on the delivery of a specific performance by the charity, are recognised when the charity becomes unconditionally entitled to the grant.

Donated services and facilities are included at the value to the charity where this can be quantified. The value of services provided by volunteers has not been included.

Income from investments is included in the year in which it is receivable.

1.3 Resources expended

Expenditure is recognised on an accruals basis as a liability is incurred. Expenditure includes any VAT which cannot be fully recovered, and is reported as part of the expenditure to which it relates.

Costs of generating funds comprise the costs associated with attracting voluntary income and the costs of trading for fundraising purposes.

Charitable expenditure comprises those costs incurred by the charity in the delivery of its activities and services for its beneficiaries. It includes both costs that can be allocated directly to such activities and those costs of an indirect nature necessary to support them.

1.4 Tangible fixed assets and depreciation

Tangible fixed assets other than freehold land are stated at cost less depreciation. Depreciation is provided at rates calculated to write off the cost less estimated residual value of each asset over its expected useful life, as follows:

The cost of raising and administering such funds are charged against the specific fund. The aim and use of each restricted fund is set out in the notes to the financial statements.

The Millennium Wind Energy and SSE Glendoe Community Benefit funds are for the benefit of the Fort Augustus and Glenmoriston communities.

The Village Hall Fund relates to the building of the extension at the village hall.

The Donated Asset fund relates to solar panels and gardening equipment donated to the charity by SSE and Macgregor Industrial Supplies Ltd respectively - these have been transferred to the Village Hall and Community Caretaker funds.

The directors have agreed to fund apprenticeships up to the value of £23,000 each apprenticeship for the foreseeable future.

The directors have agreed to pursue the purchase of land as per the communities wish and have started to take the steps required for setting up the Community Right to Buy through the Scottish Government.

The directors have agreed to fund the community caretaker scheme up to £35,000 per annum to better enhance the area which will increase tourism and bring benefits to encourage families to settle in the area. Most importantly it will make the villages more enjoyable to live in. This will continue until 2017 when it will be reviewed with Highland Council.
